EARLY KNOWN CHILDRESS (CHILDERS) FAMILY MEMBERS By Rev. James A. M. Hanna, Th. M., The Manse, Oak Hill, Ohio 16 Jan. 18980

Of our United States' earliest known CHILDRESS forebearers are those found in Nottinghamshire, Northern England, and in Yorkshire, Northern England, foourishing as early as the 1500's.

Our earliest recorded CHILDRESS (CHILDERS) ancestor is HUGH CHILDRESS I (1500-1571), who resided in East Retford, Nottinghamshire, England. He married MAUDE . They are buried in the Church Graveyard of East Retford. We have a record of eight (8) children: HUGH II (15 16_); WILLIAM I (15_-1646); ELIZABETH; JANE (died 1666); DOROTHY (died 1633); ANNE; RICHARD I (died 1605); and GREGORY (died 1589). list these children, however, not in the order in which they were born. Further research on this family will tell us in which order we are to place them.

HUGH II married MARGARET HARDY, who was of Scottish descent, and her father was an Alderman of Newcastle. HUGH II was a Justice of the Peace, and an Alderman of Cantley, Yorkshire, and later became Lord Mayor of Doncaster, Yorkshire. He also owned Carr House, later called CHILDRESS (CHILDERS) HOUSE, which was burnt down in 1884. He died 23 Jan. 1631. We have a record of four (4) children: JOHN: HUGH III: MARGARET, & FRANCIS, ESO.

WILLIAM I (15 _-1646) married ANNE WEBSTER, whose people were Scottish, in 1617, and they became the ancestors of the CHILDRESS family of Virginia, etc. We know that they resided at Ballam, Nottinghamshire, England, and had five (5) children; however, they may have had others. WILLIAM I died 8 Feb. 1646. Issue were: WILLIAM II; ANNE, DOROTHY, GREGORY and (?) MARY.

(Of the children of Hugh I) ELIZABETH, we have found nothing of her life. JANE, we know that she died 1 May 1606. DOROTHY, she married Thomas TUPMAN and died in Sept. of 1633. ANNE, married 6 Dec. 1580, to AVARY KAYWORTH, and had issue: CHILDRESS KAYWORTH, who d. 16 Feb. 1639.
RICHARD, married JANE ____ (who died 1606; and he died 21 Sept. 1605. GREGORY, married DOROTHY (who died 24 Sept. 1633); they resided in Clareborough Parish, Nottinghamshire, England. His will was dated 15 Jan. 1589 and probated 8 Oct. 1590. He died and was buried on 21 Jan. 1589. GREGORY & DOROTHY had issue: FRANCIS, SYTHE (sic), ELIZABETH, DOROTHY, WILLIAM, THOMAS, ANN & RICHARD.

For our United States connexions, WILLIAM II (1603-WILLIAM I and ANNE, we find him being baptised on 20 Mar. 1604. He married in (?) 1617 Dame ANNE RAMS DEN. They lived at Saundby Manour. We have on record two (2) children, but believe there were many others: ABRAHAM I (1620/22-1678) who married in 1653, ANNE HOWARD (1620-1681), a daughter of JOHN HOWARD. It is believed that they immigrated from Nottinghamshire, England, to Virginia, as early as 1660, settling at Jamestown; later at Four Mile Creek, James River, at Curles, Henrico Co. Va. The other son was WILLIAM III; perhaps, he too came to Virginia.

ABRAHAM I and ANNE had the following named children: PHILEMON (1657-1717) who married MARY EVANS, dau. of GRIFFIN EVANS PHILLIP

SARAH (died 1722) who married, 2nd, NICHOLAS PERKINS (1647-1712) HENRY & JANE WOMACK PUCH (PEW

He died, and was buried, 21st. January 1589. Gregory and Dorothy had issue: Francis. Sythe, Elizabeth, Dorothy, William, Thomas, Ann, and Richard,

For our United States connections, WILLIAM II (1603-), son of William I and Anne, we firm him being baptised on the 20th March 1604. He married in 1:17 (?) Dame Anne Rameden. They lived at Saundby Maneur. We have on record two (2) children, but believe there were any others: Abraham I (1620/22-1678) who married in 1653, Anne Heward (1620-16-61), a daughter of John Heward. It is believed that they immigrated from Nettinghamshire, England, to Virginia, each early as 1650, settling at Jamestown; later at Four Mile Creek, James River, at Curles, Henrice County, Virginia. The other son was William III; perhaps, he, too, came to Virginia.

Abraham I and Anne had the following named children: Philemon (1657-1917), who married Mary Evans, daughter of Griffin Evans; Phillip; Sarah (died 1722), who married, 2nd, Nichelass Perkins (1647-1712); Abraham II (1655-1698), who married Anne Pugh (or Pew), a daughter of Henry and Jane Wemack Pugh (Pew); and William (died 1725).

The early Childress family kept fairly good records, and fertunately, we can find much from their Wills, Deeds, Land Transfers, etc., to help us fill in many important data from Colonial times.
